1.INTRODUCTION SHARE-NET NETHERLANDS

Share-Net Netherlands is the Dutch knowledge platform for Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) and one of the country hubs of Share-Net International. Share-Net Netherlands is hosted by the KIT Royal Tropical Institute and has 27 individual members and 38 organisational members from sectors including NGOs, universities, knowledge institutes, governmental and private sector which work in low- and middle- income countries and in the Netherlands with a focus on SRHR. Share-Net Netherlands operates a paid membership – based on the annual turnover of the organisations – and partnership model, but also rely on external investors for financial stability.

The Theory of Change of SNI shows how the Knowledge Platform on SRHR aims to achieve impact and outcomes across the 4 pathways of Knowledge Management. Additionally, it shows the importance of the development of the network itself in Communities of Practice (CoPs). The assumptions provide insights in the underlying thinking process of the logic. Theory of Change Share-Net International.

Our Mission

is to strengthen linkages between research, policy and practice through sharing, generating, translating and promoting the use of knowledge for the development of better policies and practices in SRHR.

Our Vision

All people have the freedom of choice, are able to make informed decisions, can take action on their sexual and reproductive health and have access to quality care to meet their sexual and reproductive health needs and rights.

Share-Net Netherlands Knowledge Management (KM) strategies contribute to the different outcomes through the following pathways:

- Knowledge generation: addressing priority knowledge gaps through research and further analysis and synthesis of existing data
- Knowledge sharing: dissemination through a wide range of channels and tools of both new and existing knowledge, as available research findings are often not known by those who should use them
- **Knowledge translation:** ensuring evidence is presented in formats appropriate for the intended audience so that they can be accessed, understood and used by advocates, policymakers, programme managers, practitioners, the private sector, users, the media and researchers
- **Promotion of knowledge use:** promotion of the use of knowledge products and formats by policymakers and practitioners for improving policy and practice
- Network development and matchmaking: creating national CoPs and links with international level (partners); and matching the needs of certain members with the services that our partners can offer (e.g. between our members and the private sector and between young researchers and NGOs in need of research)

2.KNOWLEDGE MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES 2019

HIGHLIGHTS

2019 was a year of growth for Share-Net Netherlands. We gained 5 new student members, 7 individual members and 3 organisational members which include The Hunger Project, the RedCoss and the Dutch Coalition of Disability and Development. The year started with 5 active CoPs and closed with 12 active CoPs! The CoPs which were active in 2019 are as follows: Sexual Pleasure, Engaging Men and Boys, Multilateral Processes, LGBTQI+ Health, Global Financing Facility, SRHR Messaging, Contraception and Abortion, Infertility, Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE), Maternal Health, Linking Research Policy and Practice and SRHR & HIV Integration. These CoPs arranged an amazing variety of events throughout 2019 which furthered Share-Net Netherlands in achieving its different outcomes. The new CoPs were conceived at the 2019 Annual Business Meeting and following the event, the secretariat stimulated and supported members in setting up these CoPs, with a concrete work plan and budget for 2020.

The Multilateral Processes CoP organised a total of three meetings around the topic of the ICPD+25 Summit, two in 2019 and a concluding meeting in January of 2020. As we all know, preparations for the Nairobi Summit dominated the past year for many in the SRHR community. The first meeting was held in April and featured Arthur Erken, Director of Communications and Strategic Partnerships at UNFPA, as a special guest who provided input along with Share-Net members to strategise for the then upcoming Nairobi Summit. The succeeding event was held in September in collaboration with Amref Flying Doctors, CHOICE for Youth and Sexuality, Rutgers and Simavi. This meeting aimed to inform participants about the process around the Nairobi Summit. We exchanged and discussed global and national commitments with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and other ministries notably Health and Education. We also made a start on a joint communication plan for the Summit.

2019 also saw the very first event hosted by Share-Net Netherlands on the topic of sexual pleasure. This event was organised by the newly formed Sexual Pleasure CoP. This meeting was the introductory event for many Share-Net Netherlands members about how to incorporate sexual pleasure into their work. The meeting centred around questions such as "What does a pleasured up world look like for public health organisations?" and "How can we come together in becoming pleasure promoters?". These questions were addressed by looking at the latest developments, evidence and projects and exploring innovative ways to incorporate pleasure in international SRHR policies and practices.

The 8th edition of the Annual Students Meeting was also hosted in 2019. This event is considered as a highlight of the year as it is the biggest Share-Net Netherlands event which brings together Dutch universities, NGOs and policy makers to continue linking students and organisations working on SRHR and gender equality. In November, the CoP Linking Research, Policy and Practice, organised the 8th Annual Meeting at the International Institute of Social Sciences in the Hague. At this event, 14 brilliant students got to present their Master's research findings in a poster presentation gallery walk. Prior to the meeting, students attended a workshop on how to make a great poster presentation facilitated by Ilya Kashnitsky. NGO's, practitioners and policy makers were also present at the event and had the opportunity to promote their work and network with all attendees. Justine Van de Beek, Youth SRHR Netherlands Ambassador, gave an inspiration keynote

speech where she talked about the Nairobi Summit and explained a bit more about her role as Youth SRHR Ambassador.

| Annual Business Meeting | The Annual Business Meeting served as an interactive brainstorming session where members expressed which areas and topics they were interested in working on in the new year. We also said goodbye to some long withstanding Steering Committee (SC) members such as Anke van Dam (AFEW International), Liselotte Kweekel (KNOV), Jennifer Bushee (RNW Media) and Odette Hekster (PSI Europe). As a result of these resignations, five new SC places opened, and all of them are now filled. The new SC members include: Fiona Barr (CRR), Lewis Emmerton (SheDecides), Kari Postma (Dance4Life), Tomas Chang Pico (Voice) and Veerle Ver Loren van Themaat (Amref). | October |
| Stakeholder mapping | In 2019, SN-NL conducted a mapping to identify organisations in the Netherlands whose work focuses on SRHR and gender equality. A total of 78 potential stakeholders were identified as a result of the mapping exercise. Included in this number were NGOs, academic institutions and researchers, knowledge and resource centres, private businesses, health organisations and governmental bodies. The mapping provided a clear indication which stakeholders are relevant to approach for a possible partnership and/or membership. | March-May |

3.LESSONS LEARNED

Communication Strategy

During the course of our activities, it became apparent that Share-Net Netherlands' communication is not as clear and effective as it should be. The way in which SN-NL communicates is incredibly important for both the SN-NL members and the secretariat and so, we have learned that the SN-NL communication strategy needs to be revised. Linking to this, we have also learned that it is important that the secretariat can act quickly after an activity or event to ensure that a certain level of momentum occurs very shortly after the event. A way in which this can be improved is by already planning how to follow-up after an event during the initial planning stages.

Engaging Members

In relation to the engagement of members, a particular lesson which resurfaced over the past year is that CoPs need to be driven by SN-NL members and not by the secretariat. For example, there were two thematic meetings which were initially planned to take place in 2019, one on climate change and the other on CSE and online internet spaces. However, due to limited time resources for the members of both CoPs, the thematic meetings had to be postponed or cancelled. It is an important lesson to remember that not all activities that are planned at the beginning of the year will come to fruition.

Connecting Students

2019 also saw a new set up for the Annual Student Meeting 'Linking Research, Policy and Practice' which received positive feedback from the participants. However, we have learned that connecting NGO's and policy makers with students to identify knowledge gaps still remains a challenge.

M&E Framework

The first draft of the M&E framework was developed by the Share-Net secretariat. We have learned that there is still a lot of work to be done to develop an M&E framework which adequately monitors Share-Net's outcomes. In 2020 there will be an M&E expert on the team who will support this task and organise a workshop to improve the M&E skills of the Secretariat.
