



Motivations: Why do we want to engage men?

- Increase contraceptive use
- Improve women's health
- Achieve universal health coverage

Tensions in the field

- Maintain focus on women *and* expand to reflect fuller perspective on men
- Prioritize funding SRHR needs of women and girls *and* address relational power dynamics
- User uptake numbers *versus* shifts in gender norms as measures of success



Purpose of the *Getting to Equal* initiative

Could mobilizing data help expand our framing of “men and SRHR”?

- To shift global discourse on men and SRHR toward a more holistic, relational understanding of SRHR
- To reaffirm that *men matter* to sexual and reproductive health and rights
- To make the case that sexual and reproductive health and rights *matter to men*

- Men as clients
- Men as agents of social change



Their experiences of:

- Their bodies
- Their relationships
- Their reproduction

.... and how together, these contribute to shaping men's lives in the long term.



Men's lives: Reframing SRHR and What it Means to Men

Bodies

- Coercion and rough handling of emerging sexuality can harm mental health, school performance, confidence, and attitudes toward body, sex

Relationships

- Parents' son preference has had lasting relationship consequences for their sons
- Effects of more equitable attitudes in couple reinforced by equitable norms in community

Reproduction

- Unintended pregnancy harms well-being and is related to some men's limited participation in caregiving.
- Adolescent fatherhood increases employment, and reduces schooling and long-term income and employment prospects
- Partnership, fertility (whatever it may be), and living arrangements connect to various measures of men's wellbeing across their lives
