

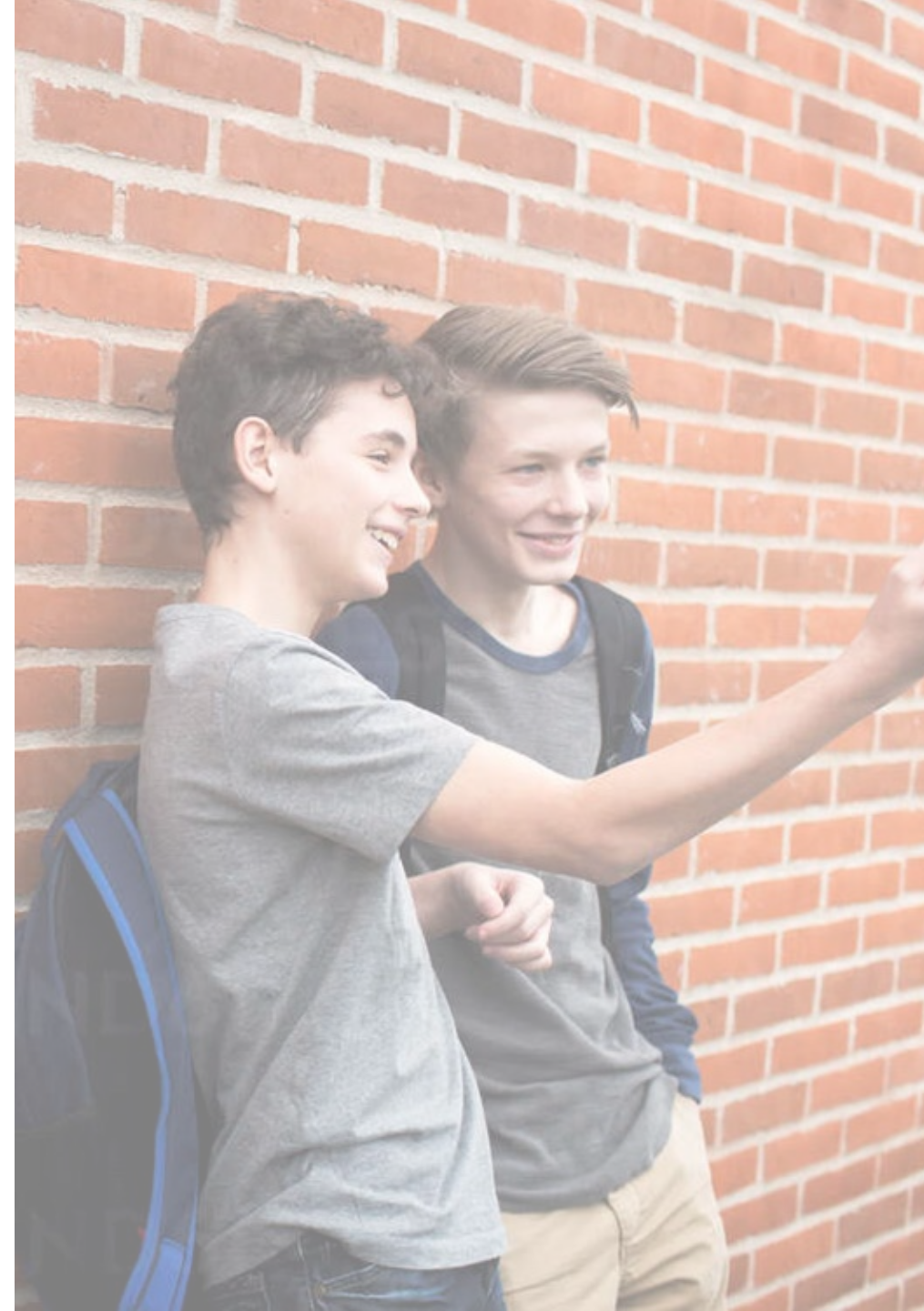

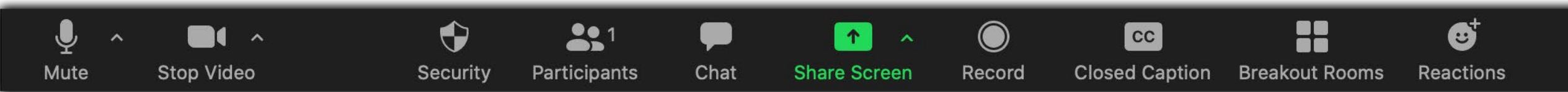

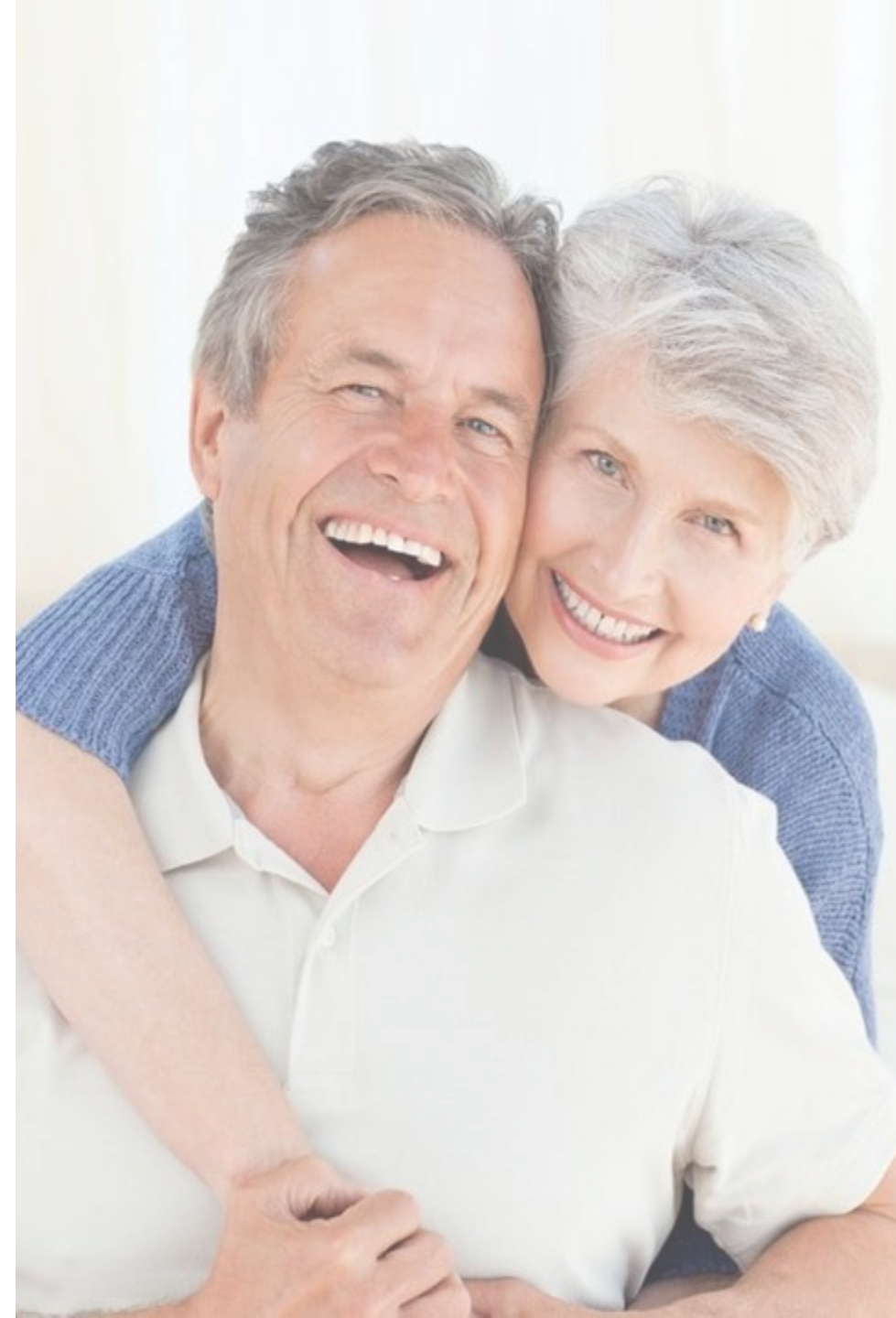

# Sexual health issues of men and boys

# Reproductive health issues of men and boys

- Male infertility
- Reproductive cancers
- Male contraception
- Condom use



# Not all men are equal

- Boys, men and the stages of life
- Men, male bodies, gender identity and expression
- Sexual orientation and same-sex behaviour



# Wrap up

- All people, irrespective of gender, age, SOGI etc., have sexual and reproductive health issues.. and rights, including access to services.
- Gender inequality is a driver of women and girls' SRHR outcomes, hence the emphasis in SRHR, and focus on women and harmful masculinity
- Engaging men in women's SRHR is necessary, but addressing men/masculinity as a problem doesn't help.
- Including men's own SRHR issues is an entry point to engage them, address harmful norms *and* promote gender equality
